COMMUNITY DRIVING ANDAMOOKA FORWARD

Bill Addington has come back to Andamooka. He pulled me up at a recent APOMA meeting in the Hall. I made the announcement that APOMA would be doing all it could to have the Good Friday community barbeque at the cottages. I made the mistake of calling it the APOMA Good Friday barbeque. Bill set me right. It was once a community barbeque managed by APOMA as a combined fundraiser together with the CWA and SES. There was also a popular annual Camp-oven Cook-out run by the Hospital Auxiliary and we hope with support from APOMA to reinstate that event in 2022. Bill and Staffy took care of the coals and camp-ovens for that.

We've lost Staffy, and Bill has retired from the cooking side, so for Good Friday we are calling for young barbeque chefs to lend a hand. APOMA Committee members and casual staff will be lending a hand too. See you there for a good feed.

At the same meeting Bill asked the town to attend a wake for his (and most of the town's) old mate Staffy at the Cemetery on Easter Sunday afternoon. Everyone has a Staffy story. I'm sure Staffy would like us to raise a glass.

APOMA will be conducting a membership drive on Good Friday because an Association without a broad majority membership has no legitimacy. If APOMA left the field it would leave the OCA in charge and they are already crying poor. The most likely result would be an increase in community contributions carried by titleholders, to cover the burden of a full time staff position and a quazi-council bureaucracy. I know what I prefer.

I prefer a locally recruited team of part time casuals working in differing areas of expertise held together by a strong Treasurer/ Office manager (part time) with the backing of professional bookkeeping and auditing services. The advantage of employing locals is pretty obvious. They are stable and can perform their duties well and with efficiency. They know the locals. The casual nature of the work suits most because they do other things as well. I don't think there is any enthusiasm at all for a local council on the Coober Pedy model. Ask them about rates. That's why we need as many Andamookans to sign onto the APOMA register and bolster our legitimacy in the eyes of the new government. Our arts community is bringing Andamooka to the world. I took a quick preview look at Cal the Stoner's Andamooka Tiger the other day. It was always going to be brilliant. The dedication he has brought to this project is astonishing. Cal made Andamooka his home a while ago now. You can help celebrate Cal's unique stone art on April 16. Easter Saturday. He is going to throw his studio open for a ticketed event welcoming the beast into the world. Death By Carrot (the band) will provide the stoner rock. They are on the return leg of a successful Western Australian tour. It was in Andamooka they pivoted and decided to turn west three months ago. They spent a couple of days in the edge2centre studio last time they were here.

The Andamooka Observatory mob are planning more concerts during winter and spring. There is a vibe around Andamooka and music. It goes back to *The Last of The Knucklemen* and that weird score that rollicked along as Gerald and Michael slugged it out on that sand dune. It was very strange music. Then there was a successful Battle of The Bands campaign with Smurf and the Petrovics expertly managed by Conan.

Who could forget the old Boogie in the Bush concerts? These were bush concerts organised by energetic local music fans in the early naughties. Now we have stoner rock live, Conan's concerts and Lot 85 edge2centre. You can go there direct online. As can anyone with a phone.

MEMBER MEETING / COMMUNITY FORUM OUTCOMES

Critical topics formed the core discussion for a vital town meeting on March 20th :

APPROVAL TO PROCEED WITH NEGOTIATIONS FOR 2022-23 CARM AGREEMENT and for future changes to funding arrangements – was supported by those in attendance and a motion made to that affect was passed by the members. We expect little change to next year's agreement and budget. It is anticipated that it might take until 2024 before the introduction of change.

The current Town Management financials as presented for the end of December 2021 are in line with budget. Carry over project funds are progressively being expended towards acquittal.

UPDATE ON OUTBACK FUTURES – Cecilia Woolford, has dedicated many hours acting in an advisory capacity to the Committee and Andamooka community, into research and discussion with various stakeholders, politicians and OCA board members about the report sent to Government re future funding and management for our region in December 2021, and the consequent response from the Liberal Government. Cecilia presented an overview of what she has learned.

The outcomes in this report reflect bi-partisan support from both sides of State Government and so we anticipate that these broad outcomes will be honored by the new Government but leaving room for further discussion. Cecilia gave credit to the arguments, suggestions, rationale and lobbying put up by the APOMA committee leading up to last December, the leadership they showed within the region, and to the support they received from the Andamooka community, all of which contributed significantly towards the primarily positive outcomes within the report, which are more in line with what the regional community is seeking. There is still work to be done on various levels, but there is a sense that overall, the new approach will offer a better way of doing things and funding the region.

Those present were pleased to learn that the new Andamooka funding model is a proposed regional levy recommended to be capped at around \$250 for Andamooka title holders adjusted annually by CPI, combined with a contribution towards town specific community needs if deemed necessary or from time to time. In the regional model there will be greater financial input from the Stage Government and other users of the outback to ensure that local communities are not expected to carry the burden for regional services and amenities.

The OCA and OCA Board entered into further consultation with stakeholders the following week via two on-line presentations to work through the proposals and outcomes, and to seek further input from communities. Also, to take questions and provide answers where they could and seek answers where they couldn't, which will assist them to move forward with on-going negotiations with Government. Several members of the Andamooka community and the APOMA committee took part in this consultative process.

COMMUNITY HEALTH SERVICES CONSULTATION FORUM – **Wednesday 4**th **May.** This is your chance to have your say and to provide input to the new model for providing health services to outback towns. This includes visiting specialists and post hospital care. Feedback postcards will be distributed throughout the town, and we urge your participation so that we can best ensure that the right services are put in place for our community.

MEMORIAL TO STAFFY – those present supported the committee's position to approve the proposal for the installation of a sensitively placed memorial to Staffy at the Andamooka Cemetery. This will also preserve a well-recognised Andamooka icon, intricately associated with him and the stories of many past (and present) Andamookans within this popular tourist attraction, and will help to promote the Andamooka spirit and lifestyle from the mid 1900's.

- and looking at sustainable community practices to build health and resilience for our residents



ANDAMOOKA COMMUNITY PROJECTS

GRANTS & PROJECTS

Recreation, Sport and Youth Centre – the Centre is ready for community programs and activities to commence. The toilet block has been held up due to Covid delays in manufacture and delivery, and the local flood event. Delivery of this secure and functional facility which includes a baby change facility is expected in March. The base is nearing completion in readiness to drop the transportable unit and simply connect.

Regional Star Club, based in Roxby Downs will assist with getting junior sports up and running and an OCA Sports Grant will fund a basic kit of junior sports equipment.Funding will be sought for children's programs. Consultation will be undertaken after February with local families to explore, plan and prioritise activities.

'The Church' Community Centre - completion of this project has also been held up due to the local Covid outbreak and flood event. Work has progressed and it is anticipated that this Centre will be open for community programs and activities by the end of March. Thanks to an FRRR grant, an upgraded ambulant toilet facility has been installed under the main roof and easily accessed from the indoor space.

Pump Track – this is another project impacted by Covid, but this is on an international level. Due mainly to shipping, delivery has been delayed from April to June and the cost has increased meaning that we have around \$5000 less to spend on the project but we are negotiating some assistance to cover for this. A positive is that we will now have an improved model Pump Track.

Community Market Place / Tourist Information Centre work has started on this project supported by BHP, which has been put back around 5 months as a consequence of Covid outcomes and frustrating hold-ups for the relocation of seniors and youth. An open meeting will be called around late March or early April for locals who are interested in getting involved.

This community enterprise will provide opportunities and facilities for producing, selling and display spaces, access to equipment, workshops and work space, and importantly to cooperative services and marketing for local artists, artisans, tourism based small business, and others who will benefit from affordable and supported options and opportunities to get their business / enterprise or ideas up and running. Also, to take advantage of promotions and sales under a banner which retains and protects their individual privacy. We look forward to making a start on this cooperative collective.

Discovery Trails – BHP has provided funding towards promotional and directional materials and signs for local tourist trails. Work is gradually progressing on these. The cottages renovation and security measures have been completed, and features which will also support the local section of the Minnie Berrington Trail have progressed well and they are looking so good. These have also experienced delays due to Covid restrictions that have impacted availability of volunteers and the CDP, and by local flooding events.

Lapidary Shed veranda – funded by (Easternwell) this is yet another project impacted and delayed by Covid and floods. The kit has been delivered and it is anticipated that the veranda will be up and functional by Easter.

Other projects that have been put on the agenda for 2022 include:

- Bush foods plantings and orchard
- Andamooka mini-golf course
- **Outdoor Theatre**
- Arts & Crafts & Training Centre

We encourage your attendance at the up coming community forum to bring your ideas and support towards future planning and current projects. This makes our job of ensuring that these projects are meeting the needs of the community so much easier and it makes our volunteer efforts more rewarding.

FUTURE DIRECTIONS

Here's a thorny issue. Asbestos and home renovation. The old houses fall down, and the asbestos is unmanaged. Things burn. Asbestos spreads in the air. In a better world householders and landlords could be encouraged to remove asbestos. We need a village approach to asbestos removal and disposal. With a properly funded program we could look forward to Andamooka becoming asbestos free.

It's a difficult issue because it doesn't affect everyone. Not everyone's house or shed has asbestos in it. It's mainly the older places. But if these properties fall into disrepair then the asbestos can become a problem. If these properties default to OCA as they currently do, it becomes an OCA problem too. As they demolish or prepare properties for resale, OCA can help us design the systematic removal of asbestos from Andamooka.

You can do a lot to contain asbestos by looking after it. But sooner or later someone has to get the stuff out. I hear tell there is a local man qualified for this work.

Costs could be shared across a number of property owners and environmental health authorities.

Another way we can encourage householders to responsibly dispose of asbestos waste is to have somewhere they can take it. There has been an unwritten tradition in Andamooka of throwing asbestos down old mining shafts. It works a treat... but it's not going to work in the nanny state. Not any more. We need a safe way to dispose of asbestos right here in Andamooka or at least a way to safely accumulate it here and transport it out safely.

Going back to a recent story. You must have noticed gas and


Time to face the Piper...

Can you spare a minute to help Sally Hurst a Masters of Research student at Macquarie University in Sydney. Sally is currently undertaking a project that asks the Australian community what they might do if they ever discovered a fossil, or an Indigenous artefact (fossils and artefacts are both included in this research as they are often items found on the land by property owners and are often mistaken for each other).

These questions about fossils and Indigenous artefacts are being asked through an Australia-wide survey which is open to every person over the age of 10, with the aim of promoting the celebration and conservation of natural and cultural heritage material in Australia.

ANDAMOOKA HISTORY RE-VISITED

Over the past 2 ½ years events have necessitated a review of the towns early history. Tours for The Royal Geographic Society in October 2019, The Waterhouse Club in May 2021, and the current Minnie Berrington Project have required additional research to shed light on old questions.

1931 is the year often put forward as the year the first of the miners arrived from Coober Pedy, establishing a payable opal field, from which the town and community we have today evolved. The Andamooka Heritage Survey of 1984, produced by The Department of Environment and Planning suggests 1933 as the year the Coober Pedy miners began to migrate to Andamooka.

As we're approaching the 10 year count down to Andamooka's 100th anniversary it's probably important to know we're celebrating the correct time period. Several versions of the towns beginnings can be easily accessed in one form or another, it's the intention of this article to deal with some of the more contentious issues, including the time of permanent settlement.

Since they're meant to be historic cottages, we should probably start with the information panels in front of them. "Albertoni's House" was begun in 1934 not 1931. Francis Albertoni died in 1974, not 1977. He's buried in Port Augusta and the base of his headstone reads "Always Remembered", it seems that somewhere along the way we forgot to remember. He and his brother Andrew came to Andamooka from Coober Pedy not Blinman, they may have once lived in Blinman but they were originally from Drouin in Victoria (mother was Irish and father was Italian). The living room and workshop weren't built together. The front room was a stand alone structure until at least 1938.

The next cottage "Percy Ward's Dugout", was built by George Malycha, not Molycha, and it was built for Bob Lutzow not Cutzow. The end dugout "Absalom's House" was most likely built by Andy and Joyce Absalom. Andy Absalom was Jack Absaloms uncle, not his father.

Now the 1984 Heritage Survey. It records the opal floater found by Sam Brooks and Roy Shepherd as being found on Treloar Hill. The floater was found on the hill now known as One Tree Hill, incidentally, it was Roy Shepherd who picked up the floater and threw it to Sam Brooks. Roy was Rose Brooks's brother, or Sam Brooks's brother in law.

Confusion possibly arises from the fact that the first opal, and consequently the first parcel found in the level, came off Treloars Hill. As Alan Treloar put it "Paddy then found floaters on what is now called Treloar's Hill, or mostly Brooks's Hill as that's where they live. Paddy sank a 6 foot hole on Treloar Hill and found nothing, he left it. A couple of days later I came back from riding the tracks and went up on the hill with a pick and shovel (our camp was right at the foot of the hill), I started sinking and at about 18 inches hit a piece of good opal, I had struck the lead, we found quite a lot of opal in the vicinity after that."

The Segnit Report describing the geological features of the region was dated 13/9/1935 not 1939. The Heritage Survey records, state the first well was put down in Opal Creek in 1946. Most accounts claim the well was put down in 1947, though it wasn't the solution to the towns water problems it has often been portrayed to be. An A.B.C. news broadcast on the 6th April 1948 reported that "the 140 residents of Andamooka will have to quit the opal fields unless water is provided immediately." It wasn't until a new bore was put in by the Department of Mines that water shortages eased. Another A.B.C. news broadcast on 12th July 1948 reported "A new bore brought in is producing one thousand gallons a day."

While living in Coober Pedy, Minnie Berrington wrote articles for The Adelaide Chronicle under the pseudonym "Puggy". While living and mining in Andamooka she wrote articles for the British monthly magazine The Wide World. The April 1937 edition gives an account of her arrival in Andamooka where she writes "My choice fell on the first hill, the one above the wells." Around the time of her arrival, two wells were put in close together and joined a the base to provide extra storage capacity. The miners had put in their own well by September 1935, and is recorded in The Segnit Report of that date. Frank Albertoni put in a well of his own, and another well was believed to have been put down near the bend in the creek adjacent to the town park. So prior to 1946/'47 at least 4 or 5 wells had already been put down in Opal Creek.

There are varying accounts of who identified the floater found by Brooks and Shepherd. Some accounts credit Oxy Nugent, including his wife Jean, and some accounts credit Bruce Foulis, the station manager. In a taped interview for the school in 1975, Oxy stated that the floater was brought to him for identification as he was boring for water nearby, and once dug for opal at Coober Pedy. He reportedly told the men he didn't know what it was because he was earning good money boring for water, and didn't feel like digging more holes for opal. When Sam Brooks next visited the homestead he showed the floater to Bruce Foulis, and it is he that is credited with the identification, possibly in consultation with Paddy Evans, a station boundary rider and another ex-Coober Pedy miner.

VOLUNTEER SA FUNDING WILL ASSIST VOLUNTEER DEVELOPMENT AND COSTS

\$3000 funding has been received from Volunteer SA to assist with volunteer development and training, and to also assist with costs incurred by volunteers which may discourage them from getting involved and enjoying being part of various community programs, activities, events and projects. In 2022 APOMA will be investing in assisting locals to get involved in a host of programs and activities from growing fresh foods, to creative projects and the new community collective group. We are keen to encourage locals to try new things or to take the opportunity to learn or qualify in new skills.

UPSKILLING VOLUNTEER HELP TO QUALIFY WORKERS FOR COMMUNITY PROGRAMS

This funding provides for APOMA to assist interested community members take up the opportunity to upskill via courses such as a certificate 1 in the 'community & family services', by offering those who qualify to enrol, training subsidies through our volunteer program. This can lead to future job opportunities.

This program in Pathways to Community Services is offered by TAFE as a 2-month full time or part time equivalent and the course is available on-line and provides volunteers with knowledge and skills to help run programs.

We can offer access to computers and/or the internet. We can also assist with training on using a computer and the internet. We may also assist with such things as stationary and appropriate attire, where this cost might prohibit some from undertaking the course or from volunteering for particular activities.

Many members of the community may be eligible for Government subsidy which can significantly reduce costs of courses, so check the TAFE SA website or call 1800 882 661 to discuss your eligibility or to learn more about the course. Together with an APOMA volunteer subsidy, for some, this might end up with fees being fully covered.

Our subsidy and support will require you to provide volunteer time to our community programs, and these include a choice of seniors, youth, children's and family programs and events.

This Course offers a pathway to paid employment in community services, so it can be a win-win situation for those who take up this opportunity, by setting them on the way forward towards a new job or career.

ASSISTANCE WITH VOLUNTEER COSTS & EXPENSES WILL HELP VOLUNTEERS TO GET INVOLVED:

Andamooka volunteer program can offer locals assistance to purchase items and apparel appropriate to the activity they are volunteering for, where this might otherwise burden them or exclude them from volunteering, Also, to help cover costs incurred.



DOK OUT FOR SNA

Hot weather has bought out snakes & lizards so watch out for these creatures and make sure that you know what to do in the event of a snake bite.

This region is home to potentially deadly venomous snakes including the dark skinned Mulga and the Western Brown variations of which may be orange with a black head, or yellow head with greenish body, some have black bands. Don't confuse this with the harmless Desert Banded Snake which grows to only 40cm long, or the Ringed Brown which is venomous but not dangerous, growing up to 60cm.

A good practice is to keep a large, firm pressure bandage at hand in your car and home.
